Volunteers, where are you?

speaker is Evelyn Thompson, a leading spirit for decades in the Shire's Caring Centres movement.

Evelyn is worried. She says a hoped-for surge in volunteer numbers failed to follow intense promotion throughout the national Year of Volunteers (2001).

"Many organisation are barely marking time, and in others numbers are falling, though the Shire's population keeps growing - and ageing!

Behind the statsOfficially the Shire's volunteer levels sound positive: "About 34% of Shire residents over age 16 are involved in some form of volunteering," says Council's Peter O'Connell.

But this refers to volunteers in general, with some doing a little and others a lot. The contribution may be only a few hours a month. (A national statistic says a quarter of all volunteers give less than 20 hours a year.)

'Volunteering' covers a wide range of activities. Evelyn Thompson's 20 Caring Centres in the Shire cater to 700 of 'the aged, the frail, the lonely, the disabled, and to younger folk with disabilities', and each of the 400 volunteer carers gives a large part of a day every week.

That's a very different volunteering from another essential service, the surf clubs, which have about 2000 volunteers (in the Surf about 2000 volunteers (in the Surf Life Saving Clubs of Cronulla, North Cronulla, Elouera and Wanda, including the Nippers wing of 6-12 year olds). "Our numbers are fairly stable," says spokesman Harry Brown, "with a welcome tendency for more young women to join".

Meanwhile referrals to the Caring Centres are running at 20-30 more persons every month, yet the number of volunteer-carers is not increasing. "Some of our not increasing. "Some of our Centres are in desperate need," says coordinator Barbara Bourne (ph. 9525 6400).

Mixed reports

The Shire-wide Precinct/ Residents Associations present a mixed picture. From 19 a few years ago, they have fallen to 13.
The Chairman of the Combined

Associations, Neil deNett, agrees the fall is regrettable but says a resurgence can be predicted if pressing local needs arise.

Help others, help yourself

"The present Council," he says, 'has done a good job in checking the overdevelopment that marked the overdevelopment that marked the 1995-99 Council. So residents aren't looking to the Precinct Associations to lead resistance – but they will do so again if overde-velopment threatens when a new council is elected in September.

"Meanwhile, some Associations are strong – those of Bundeena, Kurnell, Sandy Point and Woronora Valley for instance. They are four distinctive 'villages' where community spirit is well above average. Several others are very active, usually because of good leadership by dedicated individuals – Oyster Bay is a case in point."

The positive spirit

The group listed increasing busyness, lengthening hours of work, traffic making travel-time longer, both parents in jobs, grandparents looking after children – not to overlook selfishness, materialto overlook selfishness, materialism, consumerism, declining church numbers, addiction to entertainment, home computer fascination... an endless list.

But they also found many reasons why the spirit of community is effectively fighting back.

"I agree wholeheartedly that the Shire presents a mixed scene," says the Environment Centre's Jim Sloan. "Take the Bushcare movement. While some of its groups are struggling to maintain members, the number of groups has swelled to an incredible 143, involving over a thousand residents in caring for precious patches of local bushland.

"And more generally, the statistics show that nearly one in 10 Shire residents over age 16 carries out some form of environmental volunteering – that's wonderful! I'm sure you'll find a great spirit too among the Shire's firefighters, playgroups, P.& Cs, arts and crafts, and more.
